- Club Officer Training: This module delivers an introductory overview of club officer roles and responsibilities and club structure
- Club President Responsibilities: This module provides basic information and resources necessary to prepare for the club president position
- Club Secretary Responsibilities: This module summarizes responsibilities, explains time lines and provides information and resources necessary to prepare for the club secretary position
- Club Treasurer Responsibilities: This module provides basic information and resources necessary to prepare for the position of club treasurer

In addition, sharpen your leadership skills in areas such as Goal Setting, Meeting Management, Conflict Resolution, and Effective Listening. KidSight Vision Screening

KidSight Vision Screening program. In our District 11 – D2, ten (10) Lions Clubs have sponsored a KidSight Vision Screening event within the July 2024 – September 2024 timeframe. They have conducted 23 screenings with 581 people screened and 69 referrals. The 2023 -2024 Screening Summary shows that in MD 11 (the Lower Peninsula) 33,000+ people were screened with 3,904 referrals, 125 Lions Clubs participated,

with 360 Certified KidSight Volunteers. The 2024 – 2025 Goals are 35,000 Screenings (a 5% increase) 400 Certified KidSight Volunteers (10% increase), with 150 Michigan Lions Clubs participating (20% increase). Plans are to offer a KidSight Training session for District 11 – D2 soon. The Lions of Michigan Foundation list of certified volunteers shows that our district has six (6) Certified Vision Technicians and twelve (12) General Volunteers. I am sure we have more people in each category that are not listed. If your club has not sponsored a screening please consider doing so.

METAMORA LIONS CLUBS

Metamora was going to do the highway cleanup to get a sign put on 24 but they did not offer it near Metamora. I talked to the guy and he sent me all the stretches of road. There are available for every one of our counties.

I've also enclosed the sign-up sheet and some basic rules. Basically, if you agree to clean up the area three times a year, they will put a say sign on the road with the lions clubs name on it saying that they sponsored that stretch of roadway.

The following is a basic outline of the program (I left the 2024 pick-up dates in there so you have an idea of when they will be in 2025):

- 1. Groups pick up litter on both directions of their adopted roadway, including any ramps. Pickup in medians of divided roadways is not permitted. Pickup within construction zones is not permitted.
- 2. Groups should have a minimum of 3 people. Participants must be at least 12 years old. Participants under the age of 18 years old must have adult supervision at a rate of 1 adult to every 3 children.
- 3. There is no cost to participate. MDOT will supply safety information, safety vests and trash bags. MDOT will also install two Adopt-A-Highway signs bearing your group's name on the roadway adopted.
- 4. Groups must commit to a minimum of 2 years and your commitment period is openended; you will remain in the program until you voluntarily withdraw or fail to abide by the permit conditions.
- 5. Groups can join any time of year and litter pick up is done 3 times per year in spring, summer and fall.
- 6. MDOT picks up the accumulated trash bags following the designated pickup dates.
- **7.** The 2024 pickup dates are:

2025 PICKUP DATES WILL BE POSTED THIS WINTER AT SOME POINT)

• September 21th – 29st Statewide



an ideal candidate as a service dog, yet still are well-suited to step into alternative careers to continue their training in service, detection, veteran, and court advocacy dog organizations.

Raider will work alongside Sgt. Ryan Spangler and live with his family at their home. Like all new hires, Raider is currently undergoing his own version of "field training", and we look forward to introducing him to the community upon completion of this training in the very near future.




